THINGS FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Pastoring has never been harder than it is today. I can hear the whisper of weariness, discouragement and crisis fatigue calling our pastors to complacency. Knowing kites rise highest when they are against the wind, I fear some may miss the prophetic moment for which they have been born. If I could sit down face to face with every minister, I would say four words of encouragement.

Firstly, God is honored by your efforts not just the outcome. Between COVID-19 and the chaos of social unrest you have never canceled, rescheduled or scrapped so many ministry activities. Programs you prayed over and planned have been canceled. Major initiatives and precious momentum have been lost. It is important to remember that God is just as pleased, honored and glorified by your motives and sacrifice than the outcome. Our western culture can at times be so results oriented that we forget it is our offering to the Lord and not the visible outcome that as Paul said to the Philippians is a "fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God" (Philippians 4:18).

Secondly, COVID-19, social unrest and a stalled economy have not taken anything God can't restore. In the Old Testament, Amaziah spent a considerable amount of money trying to protect his nation's borders. God called him to abandon these costly efforts and trust in a supernatural solution. Disappointed by the prospect of wasted resources he asked God, "But what about the hundred talents I paid for these Israelite troops?" The man of God replied, "The LORD can give you much more than that"

(2 Chronicles 25:9). In the New Testament Paul assured the Ephesian believers, "Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us" (Ephesians 3:20). The take-away is that nothing has been taken from us that God can't restore. Whether that is the momentum your church lost, the staff conflict that robbed your team of unity, the opportunities that disappeared into thin air or the Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day or fall outreaches that rang hallow, God can "give you much more than that".

Thirdly, now is the time to recommit to community. By that I mean your ministerial community and peers in our Network. Being created in the image of God means you were hard-wired for community. It's part of your spiritual DNA. That also means that if we were made for community then we are most incongruent, inconsistent and unnatural when we exist in isolation. When we deprive ourselves of relationships, we can't function as the people God created us to be. I think that's what God meant when he said, "It is not good for man to be alone" (Genesis 2:18). Paul taught that being part of Christ is inseparable from being a member of the community of faith. Paul said, "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ" (1 Corinthians 12:12). By this we know that relationships are the channel God uses to grow and mature us into the people He wants us to be. This crisis will chew you up and spit you out if you try to tackle it alone. Proverbs 17:17 says, "A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for a difficult time." There is no other time in our movement's history that peer relationships, sectional meetings and face-to-face peer relationships are more needed.

Lastly, you were born for this moment! God is not surprised by COVID, riots, racial tension or these perilous times. He created, called and commissioned you to take your place in this divine intersection. Psalm 139:16 tells us all the days of your life "were written in his book before one of them came to be." You have a rendezvous with destiny, and you are God's man or woman for the moment. Like Esther of old, "You have come to the kingdom for such a time as this." (Esther 4:14)

So, take heart, my friend. Shake off disappointment, steel your spirit and lead well. You are of the tribe of Issachar and history must find you ready and prepared for what can be your finest hour.



PREPARING FOR POST-ELECTION MINISTRY IN AN AGE OF CHAOS

The Church is facing perilous times. Our nation is being torn apart by political Armageddon, civil unrest, social violence, an international pandemic, and economic meltdown. The 2020 election results will only worsen our situation no matter what the outcome. Like Israel in the wake of a national, political, and social crisis, we will need men and women like the sons of Issachar "who understood the times and knew what Israel should do" (1 Chronicles 12:32 NIV).

What will ministry look like in the wake of postelection chaos? If conservatives keep the White House, what can we expect? If progressives seize control, how will ministry be different and what obstacles will present themselves? How should wise leaders prepare for different scenarios?

In order to answer these questions and help our RMMN churches "hope for the best and prepare for worst," we reached out to a few "sons of Issachar" living in our own time and asked them what they saw. We then compiled their thoughts, identified common denominators, took note of visionary insights, and summarized their observations in this report that addresses the following topics:


- Values and Night Vision: Seven postelection values you can expect from your Network.
- **Forecasting the Future:** What leaders see emerging on the cultural horizon.
- **Preemptive Preparation:** Five intentional ways to prepare your church.
- **Discussion questions:** Practical sections entitled "Making it Real" that includes group discussion questions. These questions can be used in your leadership huddles to discuss potential impact points, team strategy, and action items.

Anticipating the future and preparing for different scenarios are practices exemplified in biblical leaders. **Noah** did it (Genesis 7-9), **King David** did it (2 Samuel 7; 1 Kings 5:2-3), and **King David's most effective generals** did it as well (2 Samuel 10:11). **Solomon** asked God to empower him to do it with excellence (2 Chronicles 1:10), **Nehemiah** did it (Nehemiah 1-5), and **Jesus** even emphasized this need in four of his parables (Matthew 7:24-27; Luke 14:28-30; Luke 14:31-32; and Luke 16:1-8).

It is our hope that this work will help you as a spiritual leader to prepare for the future and lead well in difficult times. At the very least, we pray it ignites the fires of Spirit-driven creativity in your own ministry.

3 WHY THE CHURCH IS DIVIDED



I can't recall a time in recent history when the evangelical church has allowed culture to divide them more than now. The Coronavirus, social unrest and politics have fractured the church into a million islands of unvielding conviction. Overnight pastors and churches are expected to be Hollywood producers, social justice gurus, community leaders, real time commentators and a spiritual version of the CDC. Expectations hyper-charged by people

with unyielding convictions, passion and logical sentiments. As independent expectations these beliefs seem reasonable. However, their convergence upon the local church is causing polarizing division, mission creep and irrational expectations.

Jesus taught us saying, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added unto you." (Matthew 6:33). But the church seems to lack the single-mindedness that Jesus required of his followers. Why?

Patriots want the church to lead them in civic dissent. In addition to their faith, these honorable believers bleed red, white and blue. Their passion is driven by all the noble things that have made America one of the most righteous and prosperous nations on earth. They fear our civil rights are being trampled upon and the Coronavirus is being leveraged to silence the church. However, they usually can't be found voicing their opinions in city hall, to their county supervisors or even state or federal representatives. If you track the history of their passion, they are more prone to being fully briefed on ballot initiatives than Scripture, soul winning, community outreach or serious discipleship. Because they are patriots first and Christ-followers second, they have subconsciously subcontracted their civic duty to their local church and are waiting for their pastor to lead the charge. Fear makes them expect their church to provide the civic leadership they are unwilling to demonstrate themselves. They have forgotten that even scripture recognized that faith and government can't exist in seamless harmony. It was Jesus who said, "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." (Mark 12:17) Their prevailing passion seems to suggest they would prefer Matthew 6:33 to read, "seek ye first patriotic conquest and all these other things will be added unto you."

Activists want the church to lead them in social justice. Their prevailing passion is focused on red hot social topics like racial equality, human rights, and the resistance of oppression. Their hearts are rightly broken over the injustice that exists in our communities, nation and world. Yet, they seem to have forgotten, or at least minimized the fact, that without spiritual salvation, redemption and transformation of the human heart through Jesus Christ, social justice is merely a band-aid in a nuclear blast zone. The sheer volume of their voice for social justice drowns out the message of salvation, weeping for lost people, evangelism, the mission of the local church

and Kingdom building. To them, soul winning, evangelism and spiritual warfare cannot be relevant until social justice is achieved. Their time, social media posts, conversations and focus are more likely to be spent on the need for political reform than on the spiritual hope of mankind. Because they are activists first and disciples second, they have sold their soul to making earth better instead of heaven more populated. They have forgotten that "the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God." (James 1:20) To them Matthew 6:33



is better understood as, "seek ye first social justice and all these other things will be added unto you."

Medical professionals want the church to lead them in public safety. These individuals have learned first-hand that the contagion of COVID-19 is a real and present danger. Their work in the medical field or experience with infected loved ones has brought them face to face with the realities of this international pandemic. They know all too well that people die, and that this kind of death is most often lonely, hopeless and horrible. In the light of their own experiences, any suggestion that this crisis is a hoax is offensive and arrogant. Because they are health professionals first and Christ-followers second, their fear has blinded them from the power of God and made them willing to suspend the mission of the church. They want their pastor to be as knowledgeable as doctors, their church as sanitary as a lab and life as risk-free as a fixed interest rate. They have lost sight of sovereignty, miracles, faith and the fact that we live in a broken and imperfect world. They have forgotten that Jesus, the disciples and Christ-followers have healed the sick, engaged human suffering and been boots on the ground in pandemics for centuries. As a result, their prevailing passion seems to suggest that Matthew 6:33 should read, "seek ye first a vaccine and all these other things will be added unto you."

The indifferent want the church to lead them back to normalcy. For the apathetic, their sense of balance, security and peace are found in predictability and comfort. They long for the church to "get back to normal" and have forgotten that the Bible promises us that this world is broken and will only get worse, and not better, the closer we come to the second coming of Christ. They have forgotten that the book of Revelation shows us the world will change and this change will require extreme faith, resiliency and perseverance. For them, faith is more like an extreme hobby than a world view. As a result, they are frustrated and even angry with their church, pastor and life in general for depriving them of normalcy, predictability and a life absent of inconvenience. They have forgotten the parable of the unwise virgins (Matthew 25:1-13) and would prefer that Matthew 6:33 read, "seek ye first convenience and all these other things will be added unto you."

However, as oversimplistic as these observations may seem, the disunity they have created unearths one alarming truth. God's people seem to lack a prevailing perspective that enables them to discern the difference between better and best and navigate the spiritual realities of a world rotting from the inside out. Jesus taught us that one

prevailing priority must overshadow all our passions saying, "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added unto you." (Matthew 6:33)

But as a Christ-follower, I am not a Republican, Democrat or Independent. I am a child of the living God and citizen of an eternal Kingdom. That means my passion for patriotism, social justice, social health and normalcy must pale in comparison to my passion for the Kingdom. That means when I leave



the presence of others they should be able to unequivocally and undeniably come to the conclusion that I am a Christ-follower more than be able to recall my political affiliation, social convictions or patriotic lean.

A more focused pursuit of a "Kingdom first" perspective should lead us to more productive questions.

- **1.** Are there other good but competing passions that are overshadowing my pursuit of things more strategically aligned with "seeking first the Kingdom"?
- 2. What unique opportunities does our culture of social unrest provide for evangelism in our local communities?
- **3.** How might the political gridlock in our nation give Christ-followers an opportunity to make Christianity more inviting to non-believers?
- **4.** How can ethnic division and conflict provide an opportunity to present Christianity as a faith that unites instead of divides (Galatians 3:28-29)?
- **5.** We live in a world full of conflict, unrest and division. How might the peace of God (Philippians 4:7, Romans 5:1) give us an opportunity to make Jesus more inviting as the provider of real peace, eternal hope and true joy?
- **6.** In Acts chapter 11 a prophet named Agabus prophesied that a severe famine would spread over the Roman empire. As a result of that prophecy, the early church began to mobilize relief efforts before the famine ever arrived. When the famine came, they were immediately relevant. Not because they were smart, woke or popular. They were relevant because the Spirit led them to be a preemptive solution. How might the Holy Spirit lead us to our own cultural relevance in these troubled times?
- **7.** How has Christianity's history of compassion during pandemics, famines and suffering given us direction in our current crisis?
- **8.** If my time, talents, conversations, finances and energy could be quantitatively measured, would "seeking the Kingdom" (evangelism, discipleship, service and worship) outweigh all other options?

"Seeking first the Kingdom" means there is no honor before the Lord in me allowing my patriotism, political affiliation, social wokeness or traditions to judge a brother or sister in Christ. It means my prevailing passion, my entire focus and my overarching world view is Christ-centered, Kingdom-focused and salvation-driven. Anything less is a departure from goodness.



5 RONCONE'S PLAN WEST SLOPE TOUR

Gene and Rhonda Roncone have cleared their calendar for a three-week tour of every Assembly of God church and parachurch ministry on the West Slope. The ambitious plan was born out of a desire to interact with our ministers, experience ministries and pray onsite at every West Slope location. From September 5 – September 28th the Roncone's will be pulling their camper and establishing six different base camps. They will then use their truck to make day trips to visit churches and ministries at 49 different locations.






6 NETWORK CALL TO PRAYER

Resource, train, and network churches.


Build community:



I don't wish to write another COVID 19 disruption article. What I can tell you is that your Chi Alpha missionaries in the network are continuing to pray for the Greatest Student Awakening the world has ever seen. Perhaps because of COVID-19 and the social unrest we've experienced, God is stirring in this generation a hunger for something more than this world can offer.

As the day dawned in Timna, Romania, I sat with our team on the last day of our missions trip. It had been 12 days of fantastic work, building relationships, and being challenged by the reality we came in contact with of those that had far less than we, yet were filled with joy. The opportunity presented itself to hear from the group. As happens in a setting like that, the conversation was full of story and wonder. Theology can be dry and boring. Or it can be powerfully pictured when it is in the context of the heart of God at work. What Churches Can and Cannot Do During an Election Season

People of faith tend to show great interest in political issues that impact life, families and freedom. During every election cycle, church leaders typically ask the same types of questions: Can we talk about political issues? Can we hold "get out the vote" campaigns? Do churches and pastors have to stay silent and completely out of the election season?

Many churches in America typically receive "friendly" letters from secular organizations like the American Civil Liberties Union gently reminding them that they can forfeit their

tax-exempt status if they make a mistake in complying with IRS rules. The letters are civil enough, but the underlying implied threat is "keep quiet or else."

Rather than being frightened into staying out of election year issues completely, our friends at Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF) have made available a 2020 election guide titled "Five Things to Know: A Legal Guide for Churches," which they offer as a free download.

ADF has been working with churches for years, and sponsors a Pulpit Freedom Sunday every year to encourage pastors to preach fearlessly from the pulpit about any issues, including political ones, in order to challenge the "Johnson Amendment" that threatens churches with revocation of their tax-exempt status for speaking about subjects that may affect candidates or legislation. The IRS has never taken the bait and gone after any participating churches.

The election year guide is part and parcel of ADF's ongoing goal of gaining back the right of churches and pastors to speak freely on any subject without fear of government punishment.

Admittedly, some of the IRS rules about elections can be tricky, and ADF invites churches to consult with their attorneys about specific questions. But there are some easy rules to remember.

First, pastors as individuals retain all their First Amendment free speech rights. So long as they act as individuals and not in their official capacity, they can speak, campaign for, contribute to candidates, etc. Everything that the rest of us take for granted. But things change when a pastor speaks for their church.

Second, churches can participate freely in nonpartisan election year activities such as voter registration and "get-out-the-vote" activities.

Third, there are numerous grey areas for churches like "lobbying" for or against legislation that are governed by vague IRS rules, for example, that lobbying cannot exceed "an insignificant amount" of the church's time, activities or budget. Plus, there might be state laws regarding registering as a lobbyist. That's when it's time to get legal advice.

Finally, one clear line that churches can easily remember and comply with: No contributing to political candidates and their campaigns on the church's dime. Pastors may, of course, continue to contribute out of their own pocket.

The guide contains other helpful information, including a handy checklist with yes/no answers on various election issues that instantly gives church leaders the quick answers they may be looking for.
