"The Lord will give strength unto His people; the Lord will bless His people with peace," Psalm 29:11.

I'm sure you've heard the phrase, "God will never give us more than we can handle." I don't know about you, but I have never found that in the Bible. The Bible is full of stories where people had to face situations which were "more than they could handle."

For example, Paul writes in 2 Corinthians 1:8-9 "We do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about the troubles we experienced in the province of Asia. We were under great pressure, far beyond our ability to endure, so that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt we had received the sentence of death. But this happened that we might not rely on ourselves but on God, who raises the dead." He allows us to face situations which are more than we can handle by ourselves so that we will learn to depend on Him.

Jesus Himself told us, "In this world you will have trouble..." but He also said, "My grace is all you need. My power is strongest when you are weak." I have gone through some circumstances, when looking through human eyes, made me think, "There's no way I will survive this." It is impossible in my own strength, but the Lord reminds me that He gives me the strength so that I can persevere through anything.

### Three Ways He Empowers Us

- He empowers us with His peace. One of my favorite verses I rely on when I am going through difficult circumstances is Isaiah 26:3-4, which says, "You will keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on You; because he trusts in You. Trust in the Lord forever, for in the Lord Jehovah is everlasting strength."

### Challenge

Maybe you're old enough to remember the Sunday School song, "Oh, be Careful." The song cautioned little ones to mind their eyes, mouth, hands, and feet because, as the song says, "There's a Father up above, looking down in tender love." The child's behavior determined whether that was a comforting or troubling thought!

Proverbs 15:3 declares "The Lord is watching everywhere, keeping his eye on both the evil and the good." Do you find that scripture comforting or troubling?

When one of our children took up the habit of lying, I mentioned it to their pre-school teacher and wondered if the best course was to simply ignore these tall tales. Her advice: "Don't let it slide; call them into account every time. It will give them a sense of security knowing you are watching them closely enough to notice and care."

I think that's also great advice for us as God's children! Conscience, Holy Spirit conviction, a godly rebuke--they all serve as a safety net to keep us from venturing too far from God's holy standard before we repent.

Speaking of repentance, we truly are comforted when we consider what God chooses not to see. The scriptures teach us that He removes confessed sin "as far as the east is from the west (Psalm 103:12)." Another metaphorical verse assures us that our sin is cast into the depths of the sea (Micah 7:19).

### Challenge

Today, be still in God's presence and ask Him to shine light on any wrong attitudes or actions you've not confessed. He's watching closely and ready to correct gently because of His infinite love for you.

### Pastor Juanita Blevins, Praise Church, Walsenburg The Wings of His Covering

"Because you are my help, I sing in the shadow of your wings," Psalm 63:7.

My husband and I were traveling north on Interstate 25, rolling through Pueblo, shortly before 10 PM. As campus pastor in Walsenburg, living in Pueblo West, we travel to and from Walsenburg 5 days a week. It was a late Wednesday night, and we were driving home after leading a Celebrate Recovery meeting. The road was dark and sleepy.

Upon entering Pueblo, we came around a blind curve to see only brake lights; two cars at a dead stop in front of us. One car was stopped in the lane beside us and the other car was stopped on the right shoulder...and then there HE was...instantly, a car traveling the WRONG WAY up the Interstate, with one dim headlight passing us on the left shoulder! There was no time to react. The drunk driver was indeed traveling up the interstate going the wrong direction. We were in the ONLY CLEAR LANE as we whizzed by at 65 mph.

The Lord went ahead of us, he saw the road when we could not. He covered us with his protective wing. Psalm 63:7 is often quoted as a Rabbi calls the children forward and spreads a prayer shawl over them giving a beautiful visual that The Lord is our help, we can sing in the shadow of his wings! In that moment we knew we were indeed surrounded by angels who guided us safely through uninjured, covered in the shadow of his wing.

### Challenge

We tend to stare at our lives and glance at God. However, we would be wise to stare at God and glance at our lives. God knows us and see us, He sends his angels to guard us, and He covers us in the shadow of His wings. Which car are you in this day? The one traveling the wrong way in the dark of the night? Or are you singing in the shadow of his wings?

#### Prayer

Dear heavenly Father, you know us, and you clearly see us. Your mighty hand of protection spreads over us, guiding us and keeping us safe, even when the world around us is going the wrong direction. We thank you that you are all-knowing and that we can trust you even in the dark of night.





"Early the next morning Abraham took some food and a skin of water and gave them to Hagar. He set them on her shoulders and then sent her off with the boy. She went on her way and wandered in the Desert of Beersheba. When the water in the skin was gone, she put the boy under one of the bushes. Then she went off and sat down about a bowshot away, for she thought, 'I cannot watch the boy die.' And as she sat there, she began to sob. God heard the boy crying, and the angel of God called to Hagar from heaven and said to her, 'What is the matter, Hagar? Do not be afraid; God has heard the boy crying as he lies there. Lift the boy up and take him by the hand, for I will make him into a great nation.' Then God opened her eyes and she saw a well of water. So, she went and filled the skin with water and gave the boy a drink. God was with the boy as he grew up. He lived in the desert and became an archer,'" Genesis 21:14-20.

I was recently watching a movie where the heroine of the story, in order to be heard, ended up yelling. The response from another character in the fictionalized life drama astounded me. "I am sorry that you felt the need to yell in order to be heard." In the verses above, there is no indication that Hagar was yelling. She was crying, and I assume yelling in her heart. No one but God can hear the cries of our hearts.

Life was not fair to Hagar. She found herself in an impossible position. Sarah, the wife of Hagar's master, was not able to have children. Hagar slept with Abraham and bore him a son. When Sarah in her old age gave birth to Isaac,, a promised child by God, Hagar and her son were no longer needed. Hagar and Ishmael were given food and water and cast aside.

Rejection, loss of position, and being adrift often takes away a person's physical voice. At times, there are no words to express pain and agony. Yet, hearts scream in suffering. Jesus understands suffering. He paid the price at Calvary with His suffering to aid us in our suffering.

When Hagar believed that her son when die, she laid him under some bushes and walked "a bowshot away." The distance has two different meanings. Some historians believe that the measured distance would be approximately one half of a mile; the distance an arrow could fly when launched from a bow. Other historians believe that the term relates to how far a bow string could be drawn.

### Challenge

It is hard to understand how Hagar could walk away. Ishmael at the time was about sixteen years old. He wasn't a young child, but to any mother seeing their child suffer produces incomparable heartache. Perhaps she had to look away because her heart could not hold any more pain and grief. When she released her son, God moved on her and Ishmael's behalf. I find it interesting that the measurement used involves a bow, and then later Scripture mentions that Ishmael became an archer. Whatever you are facing today, God sees, God hears, and God wants to empower us.

### Pastor Chris Griffin, The Sanctuary, Fort Morgan SUDDENLY SEEN....at the corner of Barrenness and Shame

"David asked, 'Is there anyone still left of the house of Saul to whom I can show kindness for Jonathan's sake?'...Ziba answered the king, 'There is still a son of Jonathan; he is lame in both feet.' 'Where is he?' the king asked. Ziba answered, 'He is at the house of Makir son of Ammiel in Lo Debar.' So King David had him brought from Lo Debar...When Mephibosheth son of Jonathan, the son of Saul, came to David, he bowed down to pay him honor. David said, 'Mephibosheth!'...'Don't be afraid, for I will surely show you kindness for the sake of your father Jonathan. I will restore to you all the land that belonged to your grandfather Saul, and you will always eat at my table.' Mephibosheth bowed down and said, 'What is your servant, that you should notice a dead dog like me?' Then the king summoned Ziba, Saul's steward, and said to him, 'I have given your master's grandson everything that belonged to Saul and his family. You and your sons and your servants are to farm the land for him and bring in the crops, so that your master's grandson may be provided for. And Mephibosheth, grandson of your master, will always eat at my table.'... And Mephibosheth lived in Jerusalem, because he always ate at the king's table; he was lame in both feet,'" (2 Samuel 9:1-13).

The story of Mephibosheth begins in 2 Samuel 4:4. When his grandfather King Saul and his father Prince Jonathan died in battle, the nurse grabbed him and ran. Why did she do that? Because if the king was dead, his family was in jeopardy. The old king's family would be obliterated so that the new king would not have any challenges to his throne. Unfortunately, the nurse dropped him and broke both of his feet. He was hidden away at a place called Lo Debar--literally, "no pasture," the place of barrenness.

Mephibosheth is living in the middle of nowhere, hiding out. Frankly, he prefers NOT to be SEEN. What's going on in his heart?

- I was in line for the throne. I have failed.
- I'm a hunted man if anyone finds out I'm here.
- I have no identity and no inheritance.
- My family is gone. There is no one to protect me and I can't protect myself.
- I cannot contribute or be productive.
- I am just surviving out here in the wilderness.

Can you imagine how he felt?

- Disappointment that he failed, through no fault of his own.
- Exposed and unprotected.
- Disgraced.
- Hopeless. No prospects for a future.
- Full of shame because of failure, brokenness, or circumstances beyond his control.

However, when Mephibosheth is brought before David, while he's fearfully facedown at David's feet, he hears David giving orders.

- "I will show him kindness for the sake of Jonathan."
- "Restore all the land and have the servants take care of it for him."
- "He'll be eating at my table every night--just like my own sons."

Mephibosheth is still crippled, and now he eats at the king's table. He is protected. He is productive. He has everything he needs. There is hope for a future. He doesn't have to hide anymore. SUDDENLY, he is SEEN. And it is more wonderful than he could have possibly imagined.

I think you and I can relate to Mephibosheth.

Things have happened in our lives that have brought shame and condemnation on us. These things include choices we made where sometimes we knew better and sometimes we didn't know better. Sometimes we were being rebellious. Sometimes we were doing the best we knew and it didn't turn out how we wished. Sometimes, like Mephibosheth, we feel shame over things that we had no control over, for things that others have done to us. Sometimes we didn't trust God. Sometimes we lived as if there is no God.

Like Mephibosheth, when you fall on your face before God in desperation, He speaks words over you that you did not expect.

- "I have loved you with an everlasting love; I have drawn you with unfailing kindness," (Jeremiah 31:3).
- "A bruised reed I will not break, and a smoldering wick I will not snuff out," (Isaiah 42:3).
- "Seek me and I will hear and deliver you from all of your fears," (Psalm 34:4).
- "Those who look to Me are radiant; their faces are never covered with shame," (Psalm 34:5).
- "There is no condemnation to those who are in Christ Jesus," (Romans 8:1).

God SEES you and SUDDENLY delivers you from shame and barrenness – not because of anything you did, but because of a promise He made to Himself before the world began.

### Challenge

If you're afraid to be SEEN right now, trust that God has nothing but love in His heart for you, His baby girl. Stop, fall on your face before Him, and listen for the healing words He will speak over you.

### Prayer

Thank you, Father, that even when we're afraid to be seen, you see us in Truth. You pursue us because you promised yourself to never turn your heart away from us. Thank you for seeing us and loving us still, for speaking words over our hearts that are unexpected, undeserved, and also healing. You, God, are the hope of our lives. Thank you for seeing us.

### Natasha Hansen Give them Something to Eat

"But Jesus said, 'They need not go away; you give them something to eat.' ... And they all ate and were satisfied. And they took up twelve baskets full of the broken pieces left over," Matthew 13:16; 20 (ESV).

"Trust in me and give them something to eat, I will take care of the rest" was rolling through my heart and mind this past March at our annual kick-off of our food pantry ministry. This was our fifth season of feeding our community. Through the previous seasons, I had seen God provide need after need, and all that he had asked of me and our team was to be obedient and trust Him. Not once were we ever short on the supply of food needed to keep up with the ever-increasing demand.

However, at the beginning of this season, I found myself being challenged with trusting in his faithfulness. On a typical week, we have twelve pallets of food to distribute, and on week one of this season, we only had six. My confidence that "God's got this" slowly slipped away. I started to worry about how we would feed each family. Before we began serving food that day, I gathered our team to pray. In faith, I told our team that we were going to trust that God was going to multiply the loaves and fish and feed every family waiting in our parking lot. By the end of our time, 298 families were fed and several boxes of bread and shrimp were left over. God multiplied the loaves and fish, or in this particular instance, loaves and shrimp!

We were all reminded that when Jesus asks us to do anything for Him, He gives us the ability to depend on Him to supply the means to accomplish it, just as He had empowered his disciples to feed the enormous crowd with little to no food. If we're willing to be obedient and put our trust in God's faithfulness, He provides the means for us to live a life that is empowered by Him.

### Challenge

As His disciples, God has called each of us. Our circumstances may feel inadequate, and that is okay. When He calls you and empowers you, all He needs is your trust and obedience. He will provide the way.

### Prayer

Lord, we thank you that you are enough. Today, we trust in your faithfulness, and are confident that you will provide all we require for the calling you have placed on our lives. We trust in your power and strength alone. Amen.

### Pastor Tonya Jewel Blessing Four Prophetic Sisters

"And in the last days it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams; even on my male servants and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy," (Acts 2:16–18, ESV).

The Bible tells us in Acts 21 that Philip the evangelist has four unmarried daughters who were prophets. In 1 Corinthians 14, scripture instructs believers to follow the way of love and eagerly desire spiritual gifts, especially the gift of prophecy. The Lord has clearly called and anointed women to declare His words.

In the Old Testament, the label "prophetess" is attributed to five women: Miriam (Exodus 15:20), Deborah (Judges 4:4), Huldah (2 Kings 22:14), Noadiah (Nehemiah 6:15), and "the prophetess" (Isaiah 8:3). Scripture describes a woman prophet as someone through whom God speaks to His people.

The general prophetic model that is seen in the Old Testament reflects prophets speaking to nations or to key leaders within nations. In the New Testament, the gift of prophecy is for the church body, and for the personal encouragement and edification of others. There also unique modern day prophets who hear from God regarding national and world events.

The prophet Jeremiah makes personal holiness and purity a litmus test for genuine prophecy (Jeremiah 23:9-10). Similarly, Jesus advises his disciples to expose false prophets by drawing attention to their behavior (Matthew 7:15-23, CBC International).

The Bible also says not to despise prophecy. The prophetic voice has a place in and outside the local church. As Christian women, we should be encouraged and eager to declare God's Word. Prophesying is speaking the Truth about Jesus. Exercising this gift should not be intimidating. Speaking spiritual truth does not have to be laced with fancy words or gestures. The way of love that describes prophecy in 1 Corinthians 14 refers to the 1 Corinthians 13, the love chapter. 1 Corinthians 13:2 says, "If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have faith that can move mountains, but have not love, I am nothing."

### Challenge

When sharing prophetic words, our mannerisms and character should include patience, kindness, nothing envious, boastful, proud, or self-seeking. We are Truth bearers who have an attitude of rejoicing, protecting, trusting, hoping, and preserving.

### Prayer

Lord, please use us to declare your Truth. Help us not to be intimidated by prophetic decrees, but to embrace your calling and anointing to speak life-giving words.
